### Dear Mayor Kim:

Please accept this as my response to your request brought under Saratoga Springs City Charter Title 3(H) and dated August 7, 2023 regarding the "Proud Boys" incident of Saturday, August 5, 2023. I have reproduced each of your questions and provide these responses:

1) What information was provided to the Department and/or Saratoga Springs Police Department prior, during, and after this group marched(?)

No information was provided to the Department and/or Saratoga Springs Police Department prior to the group's marching. During the group's march, one of our dispatchers received a call from a citizen about the march. A member of SSPD promptly responded to the scene, interviewed one or more of the members of the group, and recorded the license plate(s) of at least one vehicle. After the march, the responding member of SSPD immediately alerted dispatch and directed them to inform State and County law enforcement agencies of the group's activities and direction of travel in order to provide advance notice of other potential demonstrations. A copy of the police report generated by the responding Officer is attached hereto.

2) What actions were taken by the Department and/or the Saratoga Springs Police Department when it became aware of the march(?)

Please see the response to Question 1 for the immediate actions taken. As to actions taken subsequently, both myself and Deputy Commissioner of Public Safety Jason Tetu, on the morning of the first business day following the incident, spoke with members of law enforcement; spoke with witnesses; retrieved the police report generated; observed a member of SSPD reviewing surveillance and other video evidence of the incident; and researched relevant provisions of State and local law to determine whether any offenses were committed by any of the participants in the march.

# 3) What relevant regulations and/or laws were violated by the march(?)

While I am not the City Attorney nor do I pretend to be, I have been duly admitted to practice law for 35 years and have participated in the prosecution, defense and adjudication of thousands of criminal and civil matters over the course of that time. Based upon my experience and upon the information currently available, I am unaware of any offense committed under New York State or federal law. However, the march would, in my opinion, qualify as a "parade" as that term is defined in the City Code under § 151-1(A): "A 'parade' is any procession of any kind in a public place in the City of Saratoga Springs that is intended to attract public attention and that does not comply with normal traffic regulations and control." As such, a permit would need to have been applied for and granted by the Commissioner of Accounts for the march to have been legal under § 151-5. If such a permit was not obtained in advance of the march, the organizers and participants of the march may be subject to the penalties prescribed in the City Code under § 151-17.

4) Any departmental recommendations to prevent a repeat of this incident in the future.

I recommend that the organizers of and participants in the August 5, 2023 be charged with violations of the City Charter as outlined above. This will require the Commissioner of Accounts to sign a supporting deposition, as only a person with direct knowledge of the lack of a parade permit application would be competent under the Criminal Procedure Law to sign a facially sufficient accusatory instrument. I pledge the full cooperation of the Department of Public Safety in such a prosecution.

Please note, however, that a prosecution for this particular incident may well be met with a claim of selective prosecution, inasmuch as certain groups are routinely allowed to demonstrate and march in Saratoga Springs without having applied for, qualified for, or been granted parade permits. That said, the proper course of action should include a firm commitment on the part of the City to adhere equitably to the requirements of City Code Title 151 as to any and all groups who wish to demonstrate peacefully in our City.

### §27-1: Purposes; applicability

- A. Purposes. The proper operation of a Village government requires that its officers and employees be independent, impartial, and accountable to the people; that government decisions and policy be made in the proper channels of the governmental structure; that the public office not be used for personal gain; and that the public officers and employees observe in their official acts the highest standards of ethics and discharge faithfully the duties of their public office regardless of personal consideration. All officers and employees shall conduct themselves in a professional and respectable manner towards the public and one another. Realizing what is legal is not necessarily ethical, it is the policy of the Village of Ballston Spa and the purpose of this chapter to establish standards and guidelines for the ethical conduct of officers and employees. Though assurance of such conduct will continue to rest primarily on personal integrity and community vigilance, the establishment of standards is another step toward providing the highest caliber of public administration for the Village and ensuring that government decisions are arrived at impartially and free from conflicts of interest, thereby increasing confidence in public officials. It is also the purpose of this chapter to protect officials and employees from unwarranted accusations that impugn their integrity by distinguishing material conflicts of interest from those that are inconsequential, recognizing that for local government to attract and hold competent and professional public servants public service must not require a complete divesting of all proprietary interests. In recognition of these goals, there is hereby established a Code of Ethics for all officers and employees of the Village of Ballston Spa. In the event of any conflict or inconsistency between the provisions of this Code and the provisions of Article 18 of the General Municipal Law, this Code shall prevail, except that nothing in this Code shall authorize conduct otherwise prohibited by Article 18 of the General Municipal Law.
- B. Applicability. This Code of Ethics is enacted pursuant to Section 806 of the General Municipal Law and Section 10 of the Municipal Home Rule Law. Officers and employees of the Village must comply with the provisions of the Code of Ethics, as well as the conflict of interest standards prescribed by Article 18 of the General Municipal Law. The Code of Ethics is an addition to the standards contained in the Article 18 of the General Municipal Law.

# §27-2: Definitions

As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

**Board.** The Village Board of Trustees and any municipal administrative board (e.g., Planning Board, Zoning Board of Appeals), commission or any other agency or body comprised of two or more municipal officers or employees.

Code of Ethics. This Code of Ethics.

Employee. Any person that receives a salary or wage from the Village of Ballston Spa.

Ethics Board. The Board of Ethics appointed by the Village Board of Trustees.

Family Member. A parent, stepparent, sibling, stepsibling, spouse, child, stepchild, grandparent, household member, or domestic partner of a municipal officer or employee and individuals having any of these relationships to the spouse of the officer or employee.

Interest. A direct or indirect financial or material benefit, but does not include any benefit arising from the provision or receipt of any services generally available to the residents or taxpayers of the municipality or an area of the municipality, or a lawful class of such residents or taxpayers. A municipal officer or employee is deemed to have an interest in any private organization when he or she, his or her spouse, a member of his or her household, or family is an owner, partner, member, director, officer, or employee or directly or indirectly owns or controls more than 5% of the organization outstanding stock.

Municipality. The Village of Ballston Spa. The word "municipal" refers to the municipality.

Municipal officer or employee. A paid or unpaid officer or employee of the Village of Ballston Spa, including but not limited to, the members of any municipal board.

# §27-3: Acting in the Public Interest; Appearance of Impropriety

No municipal officer or employee shall exercise or perform his or her official powers and duties on the basis of family or private business, nor create an appearance of impropriety by giving the impression that he or she will exercise or perform his or her official powers or duties on the basis of any consideration other than the best interests of the municipality.

# §27-4: Use of Position for Personal or Private Gain

- A. No municipal officer or employee may use his or her position to secure personal or private gain for himself or herself, or for any other person or any organization. Personal or private gain does not include payment, benefit, or opportunity that is customarily and legally provided to any of the following groups of people or a lawful of such groups:
  - 1. All municipal officers or employees;
  - 2. All residents or taxpayers of the municipality or an area of the municipality; or
  - 3. The general public.
- B. No municipal officer or employee shall cause the municipality to expend more money and/or Village resources than is reasonably necessary for transportation, meals, or lodging in connection with official travel.
- C. This section does not prohibit a municipal officer or employee from:
  - 1. Voting to approve the municipality's annual budget;
  - 2. Receiving lawful compensation for services as a municipal officer or employee;
  - 3. Receiving payment or reimbursement for actual and necessary expenses reasonably incurred in the performance of official duty;
  - 4. Receiving payments under a lawful municipal contract;
  - 5. Using municipal personnel, vehicles, equipment, material, supplies, or property for any municipal business purposes pursuant to law; or
  - 6. Performing a ministerial function that does not require the exercise of discretion.

### §27-5:Treatment of the Public

An officer or employee of the Village of Ballston Spa shall treat all members of the public, whether a person, firm or corporation, or other organization, without special advantage in carrying out his or her official duties.

# §27-6: Disclosure of Interest in Legislation and Other Matters

- A. Whenever a matter requiring the exercise of discretion comes before a municipal officer or employee, either individually or as a member of a board, and disposition of the matter could result in a direct or indirect financial or material benefit to himself or herself, a relative or any private organization in which he or she is deemed to have an interest, the municipal officer or employee shall disclose, in writing, the nature of the interest.
- **B.** The disclosure shall be made when the matter requiring disclosure first comes before the municipal officer or employee or when the municipal officer or employee first acquires knowledge of the interest requiring disclosure, whichever is earlier.
- C. In the case of a person serving in an elective office, the disclosure shall be filed with the Village Board of the municipality. In all other cases, the disclosure shall be filed with the person's supervisor or, if the person does not have a supervisor, the disclosure shall be filed with the municipal officer, employee, or board having the power to appoint to the person's position. In addition, in the case of a person serving on a municipal board, a copy of the disclosure shall be filed with the board. Any disclosure made to a board shall be made at a public meeting of the board and must be included in the minutes of the meeting.
- **D.** For purposes of this section, a "matter requiring the exercise of discretion" includes any matter coming before the Board of Trustees, or any administrative board, commission, or other agency of the municipality in which a vote of a body of municipal officers is required regarding a local law, ordinance, resolution, motion or any other decision, issue, or question.

# §27-7: Holding of Investments in Conflict with Official Duties

- A. No municipal officer or employee may have or acquire the following investments:
  - 1. Personal investments that will be directly affected by the exercise or performance of the person's official powers and duties; or
  - 2. Personal investments that would otherwise impair a reasonable person's independence of judgment in the exercise or performance of his or her official powers and duties.
- **B.** This section does not prohibit a municipal officer or employee from acquiring any of the following assets:
  - 1. Real property located within the municipality;
  - 2. The stock of a publicly traded corporation; or
  - 3. Bonds or notes issued by the municipality and acquired more than one year after the date on which the bonds or notes were originally issued.

# §27-8: Private Employment in Conflict with Official Duties

- A. No municipal officer or employee may accept employment or engage in any business or professional activity which:
  - 1. Impairs the person's independence of judgment in the exercise or performance of his or her official powers and duties;
  - 2. Is likely to require disclosure or use of confidential information gained by reason of serving as a municipal officer or employee; or
  - 3. Requires representation of a person or organization other than the municipality in connection with litigation, negotiations, or any other matter to which the municipality is a party.
- B. No municipal officer or employee may in a private capacity represent another person or organization before the Village of Ballston Spa, or any officer, administrative board, commission, or other agency of the municipality.

# §27-9: Future Employment

- A. No municipal officer or employee may ask for, pursue, or accept a private postgovernment employment opportunity with any person or organization that has a matter requiring the exercise of discretion pending before the municipal office or employee, either individually or as a member of a board, while the matter is pending or within the 90 days following final disposition of the matter.
- B. No municipal officer or employee, for the one-year period after serving as a municipal officer or employee, may represent or render services to a private person or organization in connection with any matter involving the exercise of discretion before the municipal office, board, department, or comparable organizational unit for which he or she serves.
- C. No municipal officer or employee at any time after serving as a municipal officer or employee, may represent or render services to a private person or organization in connection with any particular transaction in which he or she personally and substantially participated while serving as a municipal officer or employee.

# §27-10:Recusal and Abstention

- A. Except as otherwise required by law or as provided by this section, no municipal officer or employee may participate in the discussion or vote on any matter or exercise or perform any other official powers or duties in connection with any matter when he or she has an interest in the matter and knows or should know that a family member or employer has an interest in the matter.
- B. In the event that Subsection A of this section prohibits a municipal officer or employee from exercising or performing his or her official powers or duties:
  - 1. If the person is an officer servicing as a member of a body of municipal officers, the power or duty shall be exercised or performed by the other members of the body who are not prohibited by Subsection A from exercising or performing the power or duty;
  - 2. If the person is an officer, and does not serve as a member of a body of municipal officers, and has a deputy who is not prohibited by Subsection A from exercising or performing the power or duty, the deputy shall exercise or perform the power or duty; or
  - 3. If the person is an employee, he or she must refer the matter to his or her immediate supervisor, and the immediate supervisor shall designate another

person to exercise or perform the power or duty that is not prohibited from doing so by Subsection A of this section.

- C. Exceptions (use of position, disclosure, recusal, and abstention)
  - 1. This Code's prohibition on use of a municipal position, disclosure requirement, and requirements relating to recusal and abstention shall not apply with respect to the following matters:
    - a. Adoption of the municipality's annual budget.
    - b. Any matter requiring the exercise of discretion that directly affects any of the following groups of people or a lawful class of such groups:
      - i. All municipal officers or employees;
      - ii. All residents or taxpayers of the municipality or an area of the municipality; or
      - iii. The general public.
    - c. Any matter that does not require the exercise of discretion.
  - 2. Recusal and abstention shall not be required with respect to any matter:
    - a. Which comes before a board when a majority of the board's total membership would otherwise be prohibited from acting by §27-10(A) above of this Code.
    - b. Which comes before a municipal officer when the officer would be prohibited from acting by §27-10(A) above of this Code and the matter cannot be lawfully delegated to another person.

# §27-11:Interests in Contracts

44

- A. No municipal officer or employee may have an interest in a contract that is prohibited by § 801 of the General Municipal Law.
- B. Every municipal officer and employee shall disclose interest in contracts with the municipality at the time and in the manner required by § 803 of the General Municipal Law.

# §27-12:Personal Representations and Claims Permitted

This Code shall not be construed as prohibiting a municipal officer or employee from:

- A. Representing himself or herself, or his or her spouse or minor children, before the municipality; or
- B. Asserting a claim against the municipality on his or her own behalf, or on behalf of his or her spouse or minor children.

# §27-13:Use of Municipal Property

No officer or employee of the Village of Ballston Spa may request or permit the use of Villageowned vehicles, equipment, materials, resources, or property for a non-Village purpose, except when such use:

A. Is available to the public generally and on the same terms as a member of the public;

- B. Is provided as written Village policy for the use of the officer or employee in the conduct of official duties;
- C. Is deemed an appropriate purpose by the Village Board through a motion and vote to approve a use of Village property.

### §27-14: Nepotism

- A. No municipal officer or employee may participate in any decision whether to appoint, hire, promote, discipline, or discharge a family member from any position at, for or within the Village of Ballston Spa or an administrative board, commission, or other agency of the municipality.
- B. No municipal officer or employee may directly supervise a family member in the performance of the family member's official powers or duties.

# §27-15:Political Solicitations

- A. No municipal officer or employee shall directly or indirectly compel or induce a subordinate municipal officer or employee to make, or promise to make, any political contribution, whether by gift of money, service, or other thing of value.
- B. No municipal officer or employee may act or decline to act in relation to appointing, hiring, promoting, discharging, or disciplining, or in any manner changing the official rank, status, or compensation of, any municipal officer or employee, or an applicant for a position as a municipal officer or employee, on the basis of the giving or withholding or neglecting to may any contribution of money or service or any other valuable thing for any political purpose.
- C. No employee shall engage in political campaign activities during his or her official Village of Ballston Spa workday.
- D. No employee or municipal official shall use official Village correspondence for the purposes of political activity.

# §27-16:Confidential Information

No municipal officer or employee who acquires confidential information in the course of exercising or performing his or her official powers or duties may disclose or use such information unless the disclosure or use is required by law or in the course of exercising or performing his or her official powers or duties.

### **§27-17:Gifts**

- A. No municipal officer or employee shall solicit, accept, or receive a gift in violation of § 805-a(1)(a) of the General Municipal Law as interpreted in this section.
- B. No municipal officer or employee may directly or indirectly solicit any gift.
- C. No municipal officer or employee may accept or receive any gift, or multiple gifts, from the same donor, having an annual aggregate value of \$75 or more when:
  - 1. The gift reasonably appears to be intended to influence the officer or employee in the exercise or performance of his or her official powers or duties; or
  - 2. The gift could reasonably be expected to influence the officer or employee in the exercise or performance of his or her official powers or duties; or
  - 3. The gift is intended as a reward for any official action on the part of the officer or employee.

- D. For purposes of this section, a gift includes anything of value, whether in the form of money, service, loan, travel, entertainment, hospitality, thing or promise, or in any other form. The value of a gift is the gift's fair market value, determined by the retail cost of the item or a comparable item. The fair market value of a ticket entitling the holder to food, refreshments, entertainment, or any other benefit is the face value of the ticket, or the actual cost to the donor, whichever is greater. Determination of whether multiple gifts from a single donor exceed \$75 must be made by adding together the value of all gifts received from the donor by an officer or employee during the twelve-month period preceding the receipt of the most recent gift. A gift does not include a lawful campaign contribution.
- E. This section does not prohibit:

1. Gifts made to the municipality;

2. Gifts from a person with a family or personal relationship with the officer or employee when the circumstances make it clear that it is that personal relationship, rather than the recipient's status as a municipal officer or employee, that is the primary motivating factor for the gift.

3. Gifts which are de minimus, reasonable and customary, given on special occasions,

such as marriage, illness, or retirement;

4. Unsolicited advertising or promotional material of little intrinsic value, such as pens, pencils, notepads, and calendars; or

5. Awards and plaques having no resale value which are publicly presented in recognition of service as a municipal officer or employee, or other service to the community.

# §27-18:Board of Ethics

A. Membership

- 1. The Board of Ethics shall consist of five members approved by a minimum of four members of the Board of Trustees.
- 2. Each of the five members of the Board of Ethics shall serve a term of four years.
- 3. At the time of the adoption of this Code and for the two years subsequent to enactment, the membership shall be termed as follows:
  - a. Two members shall serve through April \_\_, 2023
  - b. Three members shall serve through April\_\_, 2024, or the last day of the Village's official year in 2024, but in no event later than April \_\_\_\_, 2024.
- 4. Members may be appointed for not more than two consecutive four-year terms.
- 5. If a vacancy shall occur otherwise than by expiration of term, no less than four members of the Village Board shall appoint a new member for the unexpired term.
- 6. It is the responsibility of the Ethics Board to solicit new applicants to fill current and upcoming vacancies on the Ethics Board in a timely manner. Solicitation includes, at minimum, placing vacancy on the Village of Ballston Spa Board of Trustees agenda for at least one (1) meeting and on Village of Ballston Spa website. The Ethics Board shall then recommend to the Board of Trustees any prospective members.

- 7. The Board of Trustees has the discretion to accept or reject the recommendations of the Ethics Board regarding the appointment of prospective new members.
- B. Qualifications of Board Members
  - 1. All members of the Board of Ethics must be residents of the municipality.
  - 2. No member of the Board of Ethics shall be a political committeeperson, hold office in a partisan political organization, or hold elective office in the Village of Ballston Spa. A Board of Ethics member may make campaign contributions, display campaign signage, and vote.
  - 3. Not more than three members of the Board of Ethics may be members of the same political party.
  - 4. No current officer or employee of the Village of Ballston Spa is eligible to serve on the Board of Ethics.
  - 5. All candidates seeking appointment to the Board of Ethics must agree to:
    - a. Maintain an email account which they agree to monitor at least once per week during their appointed term of office.
    - b. Respond to requests for communication from the Board of Ethics members and the Village Board of Trustees within 48 hours of receiving a communication. Exceptions may be made for vacations, illness, family emergencies, extended leave of absence, acts of God, and other actual emergencies.
    - c. Disclose any prior felony or misdemeanor convictions, and any current pending criminal charges or otherwise consent to and authorize a background check. Convictions and pending charges are not immediate grounds for ineligibility to serve.
    - d. Maintain a primary physical residence in the Village of Ballston Spa for no less than six months of any year in which appointed to Board of Ethics. Board of Ethics members that are not physically present for less than six months of the year may make virtual appearances at the Board of Ethics meetings to maintain appointed duties.
    - e. Have no clear and present significant conflicts of interest.
    - f. Disclose their registered political affiliation so as not to conflict with the provision of § 27-18(B)(3).
  - 6. The minimum age for applicants to the Board of Ethics is 21 years at the time of appointment.
  - 7. All candidates seeking appointment to the Board of Ethics must disclose any current direct business dealings within and with the Village of Ballston Spa.
  - C. Powers and Duties of the Board of Ethics:
    - 1. The Board of Ethics shall select its own Chairperson from within the Board for a one-year term and delegate authority to the Chairperson to act in the name of the Board between meetings of the Board of Ethics.
    - 2. Prescribe and promulgate rules and regulations governing its own internal organization and procedures in a manner not inconsistent with this section or any state or federal law.
    - 3. Conduct investigations pursuant to the Village of Ballston Spa Code of Ethics.
    - 4. Issue advisory opinions pursuant to the Village of Ballston Spa Code of Ethics.

- 5. Conduct hearings, recommend disciplinary action and initiate appropriate actions and proceedings pursuant to the Village of Ballston Spa Code of Ethics.
- 6. The Ethics Board of the Village of Ballston Spa may act only with respect to officers and employees of the municipality and persons having business dealings with the municipality. The termination of a Village officer's or employee's term of office or employment with the Village shall not affect the jurisdiction of the Village Ethics Board with respect to requirements imposed by this chapter on former Village officers or employees to the extent permitted by law.
- 7. The Village Ethics Board may refer any matter within its jurisdiction to the county Ethics Board in its discretion.
- 8. Where necessary and indicated, the Ethics Board will retain and utilize the attorney for the Village or, when required or there is a decided conflict, will request permission from the Village Board of Trustees to retain outside counsel.
- 9. Any formal communication from the Board of Ethics to the Village Board of Trustees shall be in written form. Any majority opinions/recommendations issued by the Board of Ethics will require the signatures of a majority of the members of the Board of Ethics. While not required, a dissenting opinion/recommendation may be written, signed, and attached to the majority opinion/recommendation if the members in the minority so choose.
- D. Removal of appointed Ethics Board Members.
  - 1. Appointed members of the Ethics Board may voluntarily vacate from their appointed office upon submission of a letter of resignation to the Village Board of Trustees.
  - 2. Members of the Ethics Board may be removed from their office if the following occurs:
    - a. By being found in violation of the Code of Ethics and being subsequently removed from office by Village Board of Trustees
    - b. By receiving a unanimous vote from the remaining members of the Board of Ethics and recommendation made to the Village Board of Trustees for removal from office for violations of B above.
- E. Training of the Board of Ethics. Each member of the Board of Ethics shall be required to complete at least two hours of ethics training biannually either in-person or on-line. Each member shall provide proof of such training to the Village Clerk and such proof shall be maintained in the office of the Village Clerk as a municipal record. Failure to complete required training may result in dismissal from the Ethics Board. Newly appointed members must complete their initial training within 120 days of appointment.

# §27-19: Complaints and Investigations

A. Upon receipt of a form duly sworn by the person requesting an investigation of an alleged violation of this chapter or upon the Board determining on its own initiative that a violation of this chapter may exist, the Ethics Board shall have the power and duty to conduct any investigation necessary to carry out the provisions of this section. In conducting any such investigation, the Board may administer oaths or affirmations,

- subpoena witnesses and compel their attendance and require the production of any books or records which it may deem relevant or material. The form to be utilized in requesting an investigation of an alleged violation of this chapter shall be the form available in the office of the Village Clerk and on the Village of Ballston Spa website.
- B. All complaints, hearings and proceedings of the Board of Ethics shall be kept confidential until such time as a final determination is made. Thereafter, the Village Ethics Board shall state in writing its disposition of every sworn complaint it receives and of every investigation it conducts and shall set forth the reasons for the disposition to the Village Board of Trustees. Any findings of violations of this chapter or other applicable law shall be served upon the subject of the investigation within seven days of such service of any findings of violations of this chapter, and violations shall be made a public record and shall be indexed and maintained on file by the Village Clerk.
- C. All employees of the Village of Ballston Spa and all officials (whether paid or unpaid) are required to fully cooperate with the reasonable requests of the Village of Ballston Spa Ethics Board during all formal ongoing investigations. Notwithstanding the above requirement, the following conditions will also apply:
  - 1. The Ethics Board shall advise the employee or officer of their right to confer with or obtain outside legal (or other) counsel. No individual shall be denied his/her right to obtain and to utilize outside legal (or other) counsel. A reasonable period of time will be provided to retain outside counsel (as a general rule, no less than 30 calendar days).
  - 2. Any individual questioned in connection with any investigation will be advised whether he or she is a target and/or subject of that investigation as soon as possible after a complaint has been made.

### §27-20:Enforcement

Any municipal officer or employee who violates this code may be censured, fined, suspended or removed from office or employment in the manner provided by law.

### §27-21:Ethics Advisory Opinions

- A. The Board of Ethics shall render confidential advisory opinion only to officers and employees of the Village of Ballston Spa with respect to Article 18 of the General Municipal law and this Code of Ethics. Officers and employees of the municipality are encouraged to seek advisory opinions whenever they are uncertain whether their conduct may violate the Code of Ethics.
- B. The Board of Ethics will prepare an advisory opinion based on a thorough review of the facts and applicable law. The Board's opinion is to be based primarily on the facts presented in the request or subsequently submitted in a written signed document. The opinion will be rendered, in writing, to the requester as expeditiously as is practicable, with special attention to the time requirements of a given case.
- C. An officer or employee of the municipality whose conduct or action is the subject of an advisory opinion will not be subject to penalties or sanctions by virtue of acting, or failing to act, due to a reasonable reliance on the opinion, unless material facts were omitted or misstated in the material submitted by the requester.

D. The Board of Ethics will maintain a confidential indexed file of all advisory opinions issued by the Board, which will be kept and maintained by the Village Clerk.

# §27-22:Posting and Distribution of Code

- A. The Village of Ballston Spa must promptly cause a copy of this Code of Ethics and a copy of Article 18, §§ 800-809, of the General Municipal Law, and a copy of any amendment to this Code of Ethics, to be posted publicly and conspicuously in each building under the municipality's control and on the Village of Ballston Spa website. The Code must be posted within 10 days following the date on which the Code takes effect. An amendment to the Code must be posted within 10 days following the date on which the amendment takes effect.
- B. The Village of Ballston Spa must promptly cause a copy of this Code of Ethics and a copy of Article 18, §§ 800-809, of the General Municipal Law, and a copy of any amendment to this Code of Ethics, to be distributed to every person who is or becomes an officer or employee of the Village of Ballston Spa. Such distribution can be via electronic mail.
- C. As a part of a municipal officer or employee onboarding process, each officer or employee shall receive a copy of this Code of Ethics and must acknowledge receipt in writing. All present municipal officers and employees shall receive a copy of this Code and must acknowledge receipt in writing within 90 days of its ratification. Officers and employees shall receive copies of any amendments to the Code and must acknowledge receipt in writing. Such acknowledgements must be filed with the Village Clerk, who must maintain such acknowledgements as a public record.
- D. The failure to post this Code of Ethics or an amendment to the code does not affect either the applicability or enforceability of the Code of Ethics or the amendment. The failure of a municipal officer or employee to receive a copy of this Code of Ethics or an amendment to the Code, or to acknowledge receipt thereof in writing, does not affect either the applicability or enforceability of the Code or amendment to the Code.

### §27-23 Effective date.

This code takes effect on filing with the Department of State.

### §27-1: Purposes: applicability

- A. Purposes. The proper operation of a Village government requires that its officers and employees be independent, impartial, and accountable to the people; that government decisions and policy be made in the proper channels of the governmental structure; that the public office not be used for personal gain; and that the public officers and employees observe in their official acts the highest standards of ethics and discharge faithfully the duties of their public office regardless of personal consideration.
- B. All officers and employees shall conduct themselves in a professional and respectable manner towards the public and one another. Realizing what is legal is not necessarily ethical, it is the policy of the Village of Ballston Spa and the purpose of this chapter to establish standards and guidelines for the ethical conduct of officers and employees. Though assurance of such conduct will continue to rest primarily on personal integrity and community vigilance, the establishment of standards is another step toward providing the highest caliber of public administration for the Village and ensuring that government decisions are arrived at impartially and free from conflicts of interest, thereby increasing confidence in public officials.
- C. It is also the purpose of this chapter to protect officials and employees from unwarranted accusations that impugn their integrity by distinguishing material conflicts of interest from those that are inconsequential, recognizing that for local government to attract and hold competent and professional public servants public service must not require a complete divesting of all proprietary interests. In recognition of these goals, there is hereby established a Code of Ethics for all officers and employees of the Village of Ballston Spa. In the event of any conflict or inconsistency between the provisions of this Code and the provisions of Article 18 of the General Municipal Law, this Code shall prevail, except that nothing in this Code shall authorize conduct otherwise prohibited by Article 18 of the General Municipal Law.
- D. Applicability. This Code of Ethics is enacted pursuant to Section 806 of the General Municipal Law and Section 10 of the Municipal Home Rule Law. Officers and employees of the Village must comply with the provisions of the Code of Ethics, as well as the conflict of interest standards prescribed by Article 18 of the General Municipal Law. The Code of Ethics is an addition to the standards contained in the Article 18 of the General Municipal Law.

### §27-2: Definitions

As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

APPOINTEE: Village Board-appointed members of Village Advisory Committees.

**CONFIDENTIAL:** Personnel matters and financial matters which, if disclosed, would be of detrimental interest to the Village and a violation of the trust placed in that person.

### Motion "E"

**EMPLOYEES:** Any person that receives a salary or wage from the Village of Ballston Spa. Includes all employees of the Village and of all governmental bodies created under the provisions of the Village Law.

ETHICS BOARD: The Board of Ethics appointed by the Village Board of Trustees.

**FAMILY MEMBER.** A parent, stepparent, sibling, stepsibling, spouse, child (including children of spouse or domestic partner), stepchild, grandparent, grandchildren, uncle, aunt, nephew, niece, first cousin, household member, or domestic partner of a municipal officer or employee and individuals having any of these relationships to the spouse of the officer or employee.

**INTEREST:** A direct or indirect financial or material benefit, including private financial benefit or interest other than financial, arising from blood or matriage relationships or close business or political association. It does not include any benefit arising from the provision or receipt of any services generally available to all the residents or all the taxpayers of the municipality or an area of the municipality, or a lawful class of such residents or taxpayers.

# A municipal officer, employee or appointee is deemed to have an interest in any matter involving:

A. Any firm, partnership, association, or private organization of which they, their family member, or a member of their household is an owner, partner, director, officer or employee; and B. Any corporation of which any such person, family member, or member of their household is a director, officer or employee, or directly or indirectly owns or controls more than 5% of the corporation's outstanding stock.

MUNICIPAL OFFICER: Includes elected and appointed officials and officers, whether paid or unpaid, and members of all governmental bodies created under the provisions of the Village Law and all other Village ordinances and applicable statutes (i.e. members of the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Appeals, Library Board, Ethics Board, Park and Tree Board)

MUNICIPALITY. The Village of Ballston Spa. The word "municipal" refers to the municipality.

**PARTICIPATING:** Includes the rendering of advice or recommendation, investigation, approval, disapproval or otherwise influencing a decision or action.

### §27-3: Acting in the Public Interest; Appearance of Impropriety

No municipal officer or employee shall use their municipal position or perform their official powers and duties for the purpose of benefitting family, household members, private business or organizations in which they have an interest, nor create an appearance of impropriety by giving the impression that they will exercise or perform their official powers or duties on the basis of any consideration other than the best interests of the municipality.

## §27-4: Use of Position for Personal or Private Gain

- A. No municipal officer or employee may use their position to secure personal or private gain for themselves, or for any other person or any organization in which they are deemed to have an interest. Personal or private gain does not include payment, benefit, or opportunity that is customarily and legally provided to any of the following groups of people or a lawful class of such groups:
  - 1. All municipal officers or employees;
  - 2. All residents or taxpayers of the municipality or an area of the municipality; or
  - 3. The general public.
- B. No municipal officer or employee shall cause the municipality to expend more money and/or Village resources than is reasonably necessary for transportation, meals, or lodging in connection with official travel.
- C. This section does not prohibit a municipal officer or employee from:
  - 1. Voting to approve the municipality's annual budget;
  - 2. Receiving lawful compensation for services as a municipal officer or employee;
  - 3. Receiving payment or reimbursement for actual and necessary expenses reasonably incurred in the performance of official duty;
  - 4. Receiving payments under a lawful municipal contract;
  - 5. Using municipal personnel, vehicles, equipment, material, supplies, or property for any municipal business purposes pursuant to law; or
  - 6. Performing a ministerial function that does not require the exercise of discretion.

## §27-5: Treatment of Others by Officers, Employees, and Appointees

An officer or employee of the Village of Ballston Spa shall treat all members of the public, whether a person, firm or corporation, or other organization, including Village officers, employees, and appointees with equal consideration and without special favor or prejudice in carrying out their official duties.

## §27-6: Disclosure of Interest in Legislation and Other Matters

- A. Whenever a matter requiring the exercise of discretion comes before a municipal officer, employee, or an appointee either individually or as a member of a board, and disposition of the matter could result in a direct or indirect financial or material benefit to themselves, a family or household member or any private organization in which they are deemed to have an interest, the municipal officer, employee, or appointee shall disclose, in writing, the nature of the interest.
  - B. The disclosure shall be made when the matter requiring disclosure first comes before the municipal officer, employee, or appointee, or when the municipal officer, employee, or appointee first acquires knowledge of the interest requiring disclosure, whichever is earlier.
  - C. In the case of a person serving in an elective office, the disclosure must be made publicly and shall be filed with the Village Board of the municipality. In all other cases, the disclosure must be made publicly and shall be filed with the person's supervisor or, if the person does not have a supervisor, the disclosure shall be filed with the municipal officer,

- employee, or board having the power to appoint to the person's position. In addition, in the case of a person serving on a municipal board, a copy of the disclosure shall be filed with the board. Any disclosure made to a board shall be made at a public meeting of the board and must be included in the minutes of the meeting.
- D. For purposes of this section, a "matter requiring the exercise of discretion" includes any matter coming before the Board of Trustees, or any administrative board, commission, committee, or other agency of the municipality in which a vote of a body of municipal officers is required regarding a local law, ordinance, resolution, motion or any other decision, issue, or question.

# §27-7: Holding of Investments in Conflict with Official Duties

- A. No municipal officer or employee may acquire the following investments:
  - 1. Personal investments that will be directly affected by the exercise or performance of the person's official powers and duties; or
  - 2. Personal investments that would otherwise impair a reasonable person's independence of judgment in the exercise or performance of their official powers
  - 3. No officer, employee or official shall engage in or participate in any business or transaction or shall have an interest, direct or indirect, which is incompatible with the proper discharge of his/her official duties in the public interest or would tend to impair their independent judgment or action in the performance of their official duties.
- This section does not prohibit a municipal officer or employee from acquiring any other investments or the following assets:
  - 1. Real property located within the municipality and used as their personal residence, or residence of a family member.
  - 2. The stock of a publicly traded corporation, or
  - 3. Bonds or notes issued by the municipality and acquired more than one year after the date on which the bonds or notes were originally issued.

# §27-8: Private Employment in Conflict with Official Duties

- A. No municipal officer or employee may accept employment or engage in any business or professional activity which:
  - 1. Impairs the person's independence of judgment in the exercise or performance of his or her official powers and duties;
  - 2. Is likely to require disclosure or use of confidential information gained by reason of serving as a municipal officer or employee; or
  - 3. Requires representation of a person or organization other than the municipality in connection with litigation, negotiations, or any other matter to which the municipality is a party.
  - 4. Can be reasonably expected to require more than sporadic recusal and abstention pursuant to § 36-7 of this code;
- B. No municipal officer or employee may in a private capacity represent another person or organization before the Village of Ballston Spa, or any officer, administrative board, commission, or other agency of the municipality.

## §27-9: Future Employment

- A. No municipal officer or employee may ask for, pursue, or accept a private postgovernment employment opportunity with any person or organization that has a matter requiring the exercise of discretion pending before the municipal office or employee, either individually or as a member of a board, while the matter is pending or within the 90 days following final disposition of the matter.
- B. No municipal officer or employee, for the one-year period after serving as a municipal officer or employee, may represent or render services to a private person or organization in connection with any matter involving the exercise of discretion before the municipal office, board, department, or comparable organizational unit for which he or she served.
- C. No municipal officer or employee at any time after serving as a municipal officer or employee, may represent or render services to a private person or organization in connection with any particular transaction in which he or she personally and substantially participated while serving as a municipal officer or employee.

## §27-10: Recusal and Abstention

- A. Except as otherwise required by law or as provided by this section, no municipal officer or employee may participate in the discussion, vote, or exercise or perform any other official powers or duties in connection with any matter when they have an interest in the matter and know or should know that the action could confer a direct or indirect financial or material benefit on themselves, a family member, a household member, or any private organization in which they are deemed to have an interest.
- B. In the event that Subsection A of this section prohibits a municipal officer or employee from exercising or performing their official powers or duties:
  - 1. If the person is an officer servicing as a member of a body of municipal officers, the power or duty shall be exercised or performed by the other members of the body who are not prohibited by Subsection A from exercising or performing the
  - 2. If the person is an officer, and does not serve as a member of a body of municipal officers, and has a deputy who is not prohibited by Subsection A from exercising or performing the power or duty, the deputy shall exercise or perform the power
  - 3. If the person is an employee, they must refer the matter to their immediate supervisor, and the immediate supervisor shall designate another person to exercise or perform the power or duty that is not prohibited from doing so by Subsection A of this section.
- C. Exceptions (use of position, disclosure, recusal, and abstention)
  - 1. This Code's prohibition on use of a municipal position, disclosure requirement, and requirements relating to recusal and abstention shall not apply with respect to the following matters:
    - a. Adoption of the municipality's annual budget.
    - b. Any matter requiring the exercise of discretion that directly affects any of the following groups of people or a lawful class of such groups:

i. All municipal officers or employees;

ii. All residents or taxpayers of the municipality or an area of the municipality; or

iii. The general public.

- c. Any matter that does not require the exercise of discretion.
- 2. Recusal and abstention shall not be required with respect to any matter:
  - a. Which comes before a board when a majority of the board's total membership would otherwise be prohibited from acting by §27-10(A) above of this Code.
  - b. Which comes before a municipal officer when the officer would be prohibited from acting by §27-10(A) above of this Code and the matter cannot be lawfully delegated to another person.

## §27-11: Interests in Contracts

- A. No municipal officer or employee may have an interest in a contract that is prohibited by § 801 of the General Municipal Law.
- B. Every municipal officer and employee shall disclose interest in contracts with the municipality at the time and in the manner required by § 803 of the General Municipal Law.

# §27-12: Personal Representations and Claims Permitted

This Code shall not be construed as prohibiting a municipal officer or employee from:

- A. Representing themself, or their spouse or minor children, before the municipality; or
- B. Asserting a claim against the municipality on their own behalf, or on behalf of their spouse or minor children.

## §27-13: Use of Municipal Property

No officer employee, or appointee of the Village of Ballston Spa may request or permit the use of municipal personnel and the municipality's funds, Village-owned vehicles, equipment, materials, resources, or property for a non-Village purpose, except when such use:

- A. Is available to the public generally and on the same terms as a member of the public;
- B. Is provided as written Village policy for the use of the officer or employee in the conduct
- C. Is deemed an appropriate purpose by the Village Board through a motion and vote to approve a use of Village property.

- A. No municipal officer or employee may participate in any decision whether to appoint, hire, promote, discipline, or discharge a family member from any position at, for or within the Village of Baliston Spa or an administrative board, commission, or other agency of the municipality.
- B. No municipal officer or employee may directly supervise a family member in the performance of the family member's official powers or duties.

## §27-15: Political Solicitations

- A. No municipal officer or employee shall directly or indirectly compel or induce a subordinate municipal officer or employee to make, or promise to make, any political contribution, whether by gift of money, service, or other thing of value.
- B. No municipal officer or employee may act or decline to act in relation to appointing, hiring, promoting, discharging, or disciplining, or in any manner changing the official rank, status, or compensation of, any municipal officer or employee, or an applicant for a position as a municipal officer or employee, on the basis of the giving or withholding or neglecting to may any contribution of money or service or any other valuable thing for any political purpose.

C. No officers, employees, or appointees shall engage in political campaign activities during their official Village of Ballston Spa workday, or while conducting official village husiness.

D. No employee, municipal official or appointee shall use official Village correspondence or

other Village resources for the purposes of political activity. E. No Village official shall serve as an officer or like position in a-political party or political organization.

§27-16: Confidential Information

No municipal officer, employee, or appointee who acquires confidential information in the course of exercising or performing their official powers or duties may disclose or use such information unless the disclosure or use is required by law or in the course of exercising or performing their official powers or duties.

## §27-17; Adherence to Approved Motions and Laws

A. Every officer and employee must comply with all legal motions and laws passed by the

B. No officer, employee, or appointee shall take any action, or through inaction or withholding of information, impede the ability of other officers, employees and appointees to properly and fully perform their duties.

- A. No municipal officer or employee shall solicit, accept, or receive a gift in violation of § 805-a(1)(a) of the General Municipal Law as interpreted in this section.
- B. No municipal officer or employee may directly or indirectly solicit any gift.
- C. No municipal officer or employee may accept or receive any gift, or multiple gifts, from the same donor, having an annual aggregate value of \$75 or more when:
  - 1. The gift reasonably appears to be intended to influence the officer or employee in the exercise or performance of their official powers or duties; or
  - The gift could reasonably be expected to influence the officer or employee in the exercise or performance of their official powers or duties; or
  - 3. The gift is intended as a reward for any official action on the part of the officer or employee.
- D. For purposes of this section, a gift includes anything of value, whether in the form of money, service, loan, travel, entertainment, hospitality, thing or promise, or in any other form. The value of a gift is the gift's fair market value, determined by the retail cost of

the item or a comparable item. The fair market value of a ticket entitling the holder to food, refreshments, entertainment, or any other benefit is the face value of the ticket, or the actual cost to the donor, whichever is greater. Determination of whether multiple gifts from a single donor exceed \$75 must be made by adding together the value of all gifts received from the donor by an officer or employee during the twelve-month period preceding the receipt of the most recent gift. A gift does not include a lawful campaign contribution.

## E. Gifts intended to influence or reward:

- 1. A gift to a municipal officer or employee is presumed to be intended to influence the exercise or performance of their official powers or duties when the gift is from a private person or organization that seeks municipal action involving the exercise of discretion by or with the participation of the officer or employee.
- 2. A gift to a municipal officer or employee is presumed to be intended as a reward for official action when the gift is from a private person or organization that has obtained municipal action involving the exercise of discretion by or with the participation of the officer or employee during the preceding 12 months.

F. This section does not prohibit:

- 1. Gifts made to the municipality;
- 2. Gifts from a person with a family or personal relationship with the officer or employee when the circumstances make it clear that it is that personal relationship, rather than the recipient's status as a municipal officer or employee, that is the primary motivating factor for the gift.
- 3. Gifts which are de minimus, reasonable and customary, given on special occasions, such as marriage, illness, or retirement which are modest, reasonable and customary
- 4. Unsolicited advertising or promotional material of little intrinsic value, such as pens, pencils, notepads, and calendars; or
- Awards and plaques having no resale value which are publicly presented in recognition of service as a municipal officer or employee, or other service to the community.
- 6. Meals and refreshments provided when a municipal officer or employee is a speaker or participant at a job-related professional or educational conference or program and the meals and refreshments are made available to all participants.

§27-19: Annual Officer Disclosure Form

- A. All Village of Ballston Spa Officers shall file with the Village Clerk a financial disclosure statement within 30 days after taking office and no later than May 30 of each year thereafter. Current Officers shall file with the Village Clerk a financial disclosure statement within 30 days after the effective date of this code as defined in section 27-26.
- B. Disclosure statements shall be maintained for a minimum period of seven years from the date of filing.
- C. Matters to be disclosed on the financial disclosure form:
  - (1) The officer's phone number, email, and home address.
  - (2) The family member, relationship, tax ID, address, and type of interest, control or ownership of any real property within the Village in which the Village official or family member has an ownership or other financial interest.

(3) The name and address of every employer from which the officer or officer's spouse received more than \$1,000 within the past 12 months. If self-employed, include the name and address of the officer's business or LLC (such as the name filed on the IRS Schedule

(4) The name, address and phone number of any partnership, unincorporated association or other unincorporated business of which the Village officer or family member is an officer, employee, or partner and has a proprietary interest with the partnership, association or business and such entity has engaged in within the past 12 months, or is

anticipated to have, any business dealings with the Village.

(5) The name, address and phone number of any corporation of which the Village officer or family member is an officer or director or employee, or in which the Village officer or family member legally or beneficially owns or controls more than 5% of the outstanding stock, and any such entity that they have -engaged in business dealings with the Village within the past 12 months, or with which they are anticipated to have any business dealings with the Village, and the Village officer's and family member's position, if any, with the corporation.

(6) The name, address and phone number of any persons from whom the Village official or family member has derived income in excess of \$10,000 whereby such income was

derived from a business dealing with the Village of Ballston Spa.

(7) The name, address, relationship, title and department of each family member who is an officer or employee of the Village of Ballston Spa, whether paid or unpaid.

(8) Any official leadership position the officer currently holds in any political party, political committee or political organization.

§27-20: Public access

The Village of Ballston Spa recognizes that public access to the Officer Disclosure Forms which are filed by village officers will enhance the public confidence thereof and shall deter conflicts of interest and assist in their uncovering

A. Any person or news media desiring to review the disclosure statement of any officer shall submit as a request pursuant to the Freedom of Information Law[1] or written request to the Village of Ballston Spa's Village Board, which shall include the following:

(1) Name, address, email and phone number

(2) Name and address of any person or organization on whose behalf the statement is being requested.

B. Any official or employee whose disclosure statement has been inspected or copied shall be notified of the identity and the address of the person(s) who or organization(s) which requested to view or to copy such statement.

C. It shall be unlawful for any person or organization to inspect or to copy a statement for:

(1) Any unlawful purpose.

(2) The use, directly or indirectly, in the solicitation of the official or employee for political, charitable or business purposes.

D. A civil action may be brought by the Village of Ballston Spa's Village Board against any person or organization that violates the provisions of Subsection  $\underline{C}$  of this section or for the willful withholding of the information requested in Subsection  $\underline{A}$  of this section.

## §27-21: Board of Ethics

## A. Membership

- The Board of Ethics members shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees. The Board of Ethics shall consist of five members approved by a minimum of four members of the Board of Trustees.
- 2. Each of the five members of the Board of Ethics shall serve a term of four years.
- 3. Terms shall be staggered so that no more than three members shall have their terms end simultaneously. Existing terms shall continue without interruption with the adoption of this Code.
- 4. Members may be appointed for not more than two consecutive four-year terms.
- 5. If a vacancy shall occur otherwise than by expiration of term, the Mayor shall appoint a new member for the unexpired term with Village Board approval.
- 6. It is the responsibility of the Village Board to solicit new applicants to fill current and upcoming vacancies on the Ethics Board in a timely manner. Solicitation includes, at minimum, placing vacancy on the Village of Ballston Spa Board of Trustees agenda for at least one (1) meeting and on Village of Ballston Spa website and social media until the vacancy is filled. The Ethics Board shall conduct the initial review of applicants and then recommend to the Board of Trustees any prospective members.
- The Board of Trustees has the discretion to accept or reject the recommendations
  of the Ethics Board regarding the appointment of prospective new members.

## B. Qualifications of Board Members

- 1. All members of the Board of Ethics must be residents of the Village of Ballston Spa.
- 2. No member of the Board of Ethics shall be a political committee person, hold office in a partisan political organization, or hold elective office in the Village of Ballston Spa. A Board of Ethics member may make campaign contributions, display campaign signage, and vote.
- 3. Not more than three members of the Board of Ethics may be members of the same political party.
- 4. No current officer or employee of the Village of Ballston Spa is eligible to serve on the Board of Ethics.
- 5. All candidates seeking appointment to the Board of Ethics must agree to:
  - a. Maintain an email account which they agree to monitor at least once per week during their appointed term of office.
  - b. Respond to requests for communication from the Board of Ethics members and the Village Board of Trustees within 48 hours of receiving a communication. Exceptions may be made for vacations, illness, family emergencies, extended leave of absence, acts of God, and other actual emergencies.
  - c. Disclose any prior felony or misdemeanor convictions, and any current pending criminal charges or otherwise consent to and authorize a

background check. Convictions and pending charges are not immediate grounds for ineligibility to serve.

- d. Maintain and inhabit a primary physical residence in the Village of Ballston Spa for no less than seven months of any year in which appointed to Board of Ethics.
- e. Board of Ethics members that are not physically present for a meeting may make a virtual appearance at the Board of Ethics meeting to maintain appointed duties, provided that a quorum is present in person.

f. Have no clear and present significant conflicts of interest.

g. Disclose their registered political affiliation so as not to conflict with the provision of § 27-18(B)(3).

6. The minimum age for applicants to the Board of Ethics is 21 years at the time of appointment.

7. All candidates seeking appointment to the Board of Ethics must complete the Committee Interest Form, disclose any current direct business dealings within and with the Village of Ballston Spa and complete the Officer Disclosure Form upon appointment or the effective date of this code as defined in section 27-26 and annually thereafter

# C. Powers and Duties of the Board of Ethics:

- 1. The Board of Ethics shall select its own Chairperson from within the Board for a one-year term and delegate authority to the Chairperson to act in the name of the Board between meetings of the Board of Ethics provided that the delegation is in writing and the specific powers to be delegated are enumerated, and further provided that the Board of Ethics may not delegate the power to conduct hearings, determine violations, recommend disciplinary action, impost civil fines, refer any matter to a prosecutor or render advisory opinions, except at stated in Section 27-21. If the Chairperson leaves prior to the end of the one-year term, the Board of Ethics will select a chair to serve the remainder of the term.
- Prescribe and promulgate rules and regulations governing its own internal organization and procedures in a manner not inconsistent with this section or any state or federal law.
- 3. Conduct investigations pursuant to the Village of Ballston Spa Code of Ethics.
- 4. Issue advisory opinions pursuant to the Village of Bailston Spa Code of Ethics.

Conduct hearings, recommend disciplinary action and initiate appropriate actions and proceedings pursuant to the Village of Ballston Spa Code of Ethics.

6. In the case of a hearing held by the Board of Ethics, the due process procedural mechanisms shall be substantially similar to those set forth in Article 3 of the State Administrative Procedure Act. The Ethics Board shall conduct and complete the hearing with reasonable promptness, unless, in its discretion, the Ethics Board refers the matter to the authority or person or body authorized by law to impose disciplinary action or unless the Ethics Board refers the matter to the appropriate prosecutor. If such a referral is made, or if a matter is the subject of another governmental inquiry investigation or judicial proceeding, the Ethics Board may adjourn the matter pending a final determination of such matter by the other authority, person, body, or law enforcement agency.

- 7. The Ethics Board of the Village of Ballston Spa may act only with respect to officers, employees, and appointees of the municipality and persons having business dealings with the municipality. The termination of a Village officer's or employee's term of office or employment with the Village shall not affect the jurisdiction of the Village Ethics Board with respect to requirements imposed by this chapter on former Village officers or employees to the extent permitted by law.
- 8. The Village Ethics Board may refer any matter within its jurisdiction to the county Ethics Board in its discretion. The Ethics Board shall refer to the appropriate law enforcement agency any facts or evidence that comes into its possession that reasonably indicates possible criminal violations.
- 9. Where necessary and indicated, the Ethics Board will retain and utilize the attorney for the Village or, when required or there is a decided conflict, will request permission from the Village Board of Trustees to retain outside counsei.
- 10. Any formal communication from the Board of Ethics to the Village Board of Trustees shall be in written form. Any majority opinions/recommendations issued by the Board of Ethics will require the signatures of a majority of the members of the Board of Ethics. While not required, a dissenting opinion/recommendation may be written, signed, and attached to the majority opinion/recommendation if the members in the minority so choose.
- 11. The Ethics Board will hold meetings in order to carry out its power and duties. Other than meetings focused on confidential investigations, meetings of the Board shall be subject to the requirements of the New York State Open Meetings Law. This includes meetings, or parts of meetings, to add members, make recommendations for code changes, and any other business that does not require confidentiality.
- D. Removal of appointed Ethics Board Members.
  - Appointed members of the Ethics Board may voluntarily vacate from their appointed office upon submission of a letter of resignation to the Village Board of Trustees.
  - 2. Members of the Ethics Board may be removed from their office if the following occurs:
    - a. By being found in violation of the Code of Ethics and being subsequently removed from office by Village Board of Trustees. The Village Board must give the Board member written notice and an opportunity to be heard.
    - b. By receiving a unanimous vote from the remaining members of the Board of Ethics and recommendation made to the Village Board of Trustees for removal from office for violations of B above.
- E. Training of the Board of Ethics. Each member of the Board of Ethics shall be required to complete at least three hours of ethics training per year either in-person or on-line. Each member shall provide proof of such training to the Village Clerk and such proof shall be maintained in the office of the Village Clerk as a municipal record. Failure to complete required training for more than one year may result in dismissal from the Ethics Board.

Newly appointed members must complete their initial training within 120 days of appointment. The Village Clerk will identify and disseminate training resources and opportunities to the members.

#### §27-22: Complaints and Investigations

- A. Upon receipt of a form duly sworn by the person requesting an investigation of an alleged violation of this chapter or upon the Board determining on its own initiative that a violation of this chapter may exist, the Ethics Board shall have the power and duty to conduct any investigation necessary to carry out the provisions of this section. In conducting any such investigation, the Board may administer oaths or affirmations, subpoena witnesses and compel their attendance and require the production of any books or records which it may deem relevant or material. The form to be utilized in requesting an investigation of an alleged violation of this chapter shall be the form available in the office of the Village Clerk and on the Village of Ballston Spa website.
- B. All complaints, hearings and proceedings of the Board of Ethics shall be kept confidential until such time as a final determination is made. Thereafter, the Village Ethics Board shall state in writing its disposition of every sworn complaint it receives and of every investigation it conducts and shall set forth the reasons for the disposition to the Village Board of Trustees. Any findings of violations of this chapter or other applicable law shall be served upon the subject of the investigation within seven days of such service of any findings of violations of this chapter, and violations shall be made a public record and shall be indexed and maintained on file by the Village Clerk.
- C. All employees and appointees of the Village of Ballston Spa and all officers (whether paid or unpaid) are required to fully cooperate with the reasonable requests of the Village of Ballston Spa Ethics Board during all formal ongoing investigations. Notwithstanding the above requirement, the following conditions will also apply:
  - 1. The Ethics Board shall advise the employee, officer, or appointee of their right to confer with or obtain outside legal (or other) counsel. No individual shall be denied their right to obtain and to utilize outside legal (or other) counsel. A reasonable period of time will be provided to retain outside counsel (as a general rule, no less than 30 calendar days).
  - 2. Any individual questioned in connection with any investigation will be advised whether they are a target and/or subject of that investigation within 5 days after a complaint has been made.
- D. The Village Ethics Board shall state, in writing, its disposition of every sworn complaint it receives and of every investigation it conducts and shall set forth the reasons for the disposition to the Village Board. The findings of the Ethics Board will be sent to the subject of the investigation within seven (7) days after such findings become final.

## §27-23: Enforcement - Penalties for Offenses

A. Employee-Related Enforcement: In its discretion and after a hearing in accordance with Article 3 of the State Administrative Procedure Act (SAPA), and subject to § 75

of the Civil Service Law and any collective bargaining agreements, to the extent practicable, the Village Ethics Board may recommend for action to the Board of Trustees appropriate disciplinary action which may include a written warning, or reprimand, forfeiture of accrued leave with pay, required attendance at ethics training seminars, suspension or termination of employment to the authority or person or body authorized by law to impose such sanctions, reimbursement for any costs incurred directly by the Village as a result of the ethical violation, or other costs associated with addressing the ethical violation.

- B. Enforcement against Appointees and Public Officers other than Board of Trustees: The Ethics Board may file an application with the Supreme Court for removal from office. It may recommend censure by the Board of Trustees. The Ethics Board can also, under its own action issue a public statement of censure.
- C. Enforcement against Members of the Board of Trustees: The Ethics Board can issue a public resolution of censure against members of the Board of Trustees. Such resolution will be read at a public Board of Trustees meeting and entered into the public record.
- D. The Village Ethics Board shall conduct and complete the hearing with reasonable promptness and shall not act without notice and opportunity for the target or subject of the investigation to be heard and shall observe appropriate due process.

## §27-24: Ethics Advisory Opinions

- A. The Board of Ethics shall render confidential advisory opinions to officers, employees, and appointees of the Village of Ballston Spa with respect to Article 18 of the General Municipal law and this Code of Ethics. Officers, employees, and appointees of the municipality are encouraged to seek advisory opinions whenever they are uncertain whether their conduct may violate the Code of Ethics.
- B. The Board of Ethics will prepare an advisory opinion based on a thorough review of the facts and applicable law. The Board's opinion is to be based primarily on the facts presented in the request or subsequently submitted in a written signed document. The opinion will be rendered, in writing, to the requester as expeditiously as is practicable, with special attention to the time requirements of a given case.
- C. An officer, employee, or appointee of the municipality whose conduct or action is the subject of an advisory opinion will not be subject to penalties or sanctions by virtue of acting, or failing to act, due to a reasonable reliance on the opinion, unless material facts were omitted or misstated in the material submitted by the requester.
- D. The Board of Ethics will maintain a confidential indexed file of all advisory opinions issued by the Board, which will be kept and maintained by the Village Clerk.

## §27-25: Posting and Distribution of Code

A. The Village of Ballston Spa must promptly cause a copy of this Code of Ethics and a copy of Article 18, §§ 800-809, of the General Municipal Law, and a copy of any

amendment to this Code of Ethics, to be posted publicly and conspicuously in each building under the municipality's control and on the Village of Ballston Spa website. The Code must be posted within 10 days following the date on which the Code takes effect. An amendment to the Code must be posted within 10 days following the date on which the amendment takes effect.

- B. The Village of Ballston Spa must promptly cause a copy of this Code of Ethics and a copy of Article 18, §§ 800-809, of the General Municipal Law, and a copy of any amendment to this Code of Ethics, to be distributed to every person who is or becomes an officer, employee, or appointee of the Village of Ballston Spa. Such distribution can be via electronic mail.
- C. As a part of the onboarding process, each officer shall complete the Officer Disclosure Form and each municipal officer, employee, and appointee will receive a copy of this Code of Ethics and must acknowledge receipt in writing. All present municipal officers and employees shall receive a copy of this Code and must acknowledge receipt in writing within 90 days of its ratification. Officers and employees shall receive copies of any amendments to the Code and must acknowledge receipt in writing. Such acknowledgements must be filed with the Village Clerk, who must maintain such acknowledgements as a public record.
- D. The failure to post this Code of Ethics or an amendment to the code does not affect either the applicability or enforceability of the Code of Ethics or the amendment. The failure of a municipal officer, employee, or applicant to receive a copy of this Code of Ethics or an amendment to the Code, or to acknowledge receipt thereof in writing, does not affect either the applicability or enforceability of the Code or amendment to the Code.

### §27-26 Effective date.

This code takes effect on filing with the Department of State.

WHEREAS, the Village Board of the Village of Ballston Spa, Saratoga County, NY ("Village Board") proposes to adopt an updated Comprehensive Plan (the "Action"); and

WHEREAS, this negative declaration is prepared in accordance with Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law: the NY State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") and its implementing regulations set forth in 6 NYCRR Part 617 ("Regulations"); and

WHEREAS, the Village Board designated itself Lead Agency for review of the comprehensive plan and LWRP under the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") and issued a Full Environmental Assessment Form (EAF) pursuant to 6 NYCRR Part 617; and

WHEREAS, the Full EAF has been prepared in conformance with the regulations at 6NYCRR Part 617 implementing the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act to review the Village of Ballston Spa Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Comprehensive Plan has been developed as part of an extensive public process including a series of advisory committee meetings conducted over the past two years, including community and public review meetings; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board, with the assistance of its planning consultant Behan Planning and Design with guidance from the village-appointed advisory committee, has prepared the Comprehensive Plan, and the Village Board has been actively engaged in the process of the development of the draft Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board determined that the information submitted in the Full Environmental Assessment Form was complete pursuant to 6NYCRR Part 617 and circulated the EAF to involved agencies; and

WHEREAS, the advisory committee that was actively engaged in the preparation of the Comprehensive Plan has recommended the adoption of the plan by the Village Board; and

WHEREAS, The Saratoga County Planning Board conducted favorable review of the Comprehensive Plan at its meeting on July 20, 2023; and

WHEREAS, The Village Board conducted a duly noticed Public Hearing on the draft Comprehensive Plan on August 14, 2023, and August 28, 2023, where public comment was heard; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board, as lead agency for the environmental review of the Action, has reviewed the Action and all relevant comments, supporting information and documentation, has considered the criteria set forth in 6 NYCRR § 617.7 and has determined that there will be no significant adverse environmental impacts associated with the Action; and

**WHEREAS**, this negative declaration is supported and substantiated by the following conclusions of the Lead Agency:

In the policy judgment of the Village Board, as documented in the Comprehensive Plan and Full EAF, that the proposed Comprehensive Plan will provide beneficial impacts to the village toward continued revitalization of the unique village setting, improving access to the Kayaderosseras Creek, enhancements to the pedestrian environment and the transportation system, investment in infrastructure needs to support current residents and appropriate new development, recognition of the importance of the village's historic and cultural resources, fostering a mix of housing opportunities to support a diverse community and the protection of the village's natural resources.

The recommendations put forth in the Comprehensive Plan were derived with significant input from the community and were made after consideration of the village's demographic trends, economic setting and natural and cultural resources and the adoption of the Comprehensive Plan would best ensure that the community's goals for the future of the village are achieved. As a result the Comprehensive Plan guides village policies and future decision making so that the character of Ballston Spa is maintained and enhanced in a manner consistent with the community's shared vision.

The adoption of the Comprehensive Plan will not directly result in the approval of any development activity, either private or public. The plan and Full EAF took into consideration the land uses, management of development, and maintenance of resources for the areas involved, and provided a platform to analyze the proposed action.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Village of Ballston Spa Village Board makes the following findings based upon the conclusions identified above:

- 1. The adoption of Comprehensive Plan is not anticipated to have a significant adverse impact on the environment including land and water resources, air quality, plants and animals, agricultural land resources, aesthetic, historic and archaeological resources, open space and recreation resources, critical environmental areas, transportation, energy, noise, odor, public health, and growth and community character.
- 2. The adoption of the Comprehensive Plan will have a beneficial effect on transportation in the village by advocating for the policies and investments outlined in the plan and related village transportation plans.
- 3. The adoption of the Comprehensive Plan as proposed would provide the best combination of appropriately scaled growth, community enhancement, and natural resource protection in accordance with the shared goals of the village residents; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, future land use, zoning and related land use decisions considered for adoption by the village or other lead agencies shall be guided by the goals and land use recommendations set forth in the Comprehensive Plan; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Village Board, acting as lead agency, has examined the impacts which may be reasonably anticipated to result from the Action, and has determined that it will not have any significant adverse impact on the environment as set forth in the Full EAF; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Village Board hereby issues this Negative Declaration and notice thereof pursuant to the requirements of SEQRA and its implementing Regulations; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Village Board hereby authorizes the filing this Negative Declaration and notice thereof pursuant to the requirements of SEQRA and 6 NYCRR § 617.12 of its implementing Regulations; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Village of Ballston Spa hereby adopts the Village of Ballston Spa Comprehensive Plan dated April 11, 2023, pursuant to New York State Village Law and shall file a copy of the Comprehensive Plan with the village clerk and the Saratoga County Planning Board.

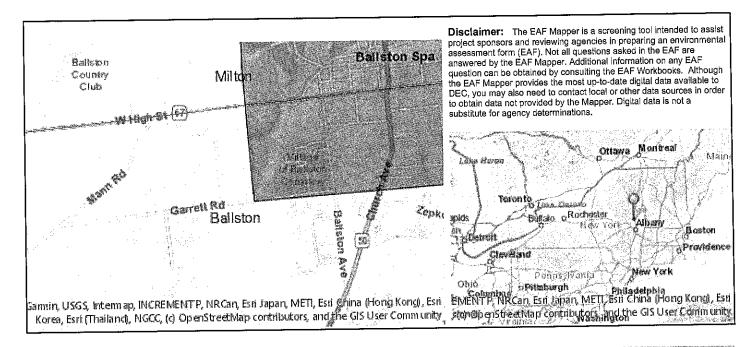

#### Overview

This full Environmental Assessment Form (EAF) provides the Village of Ballston Spa and Village Board of Trustees, interested agencies, and the public with an understanding of the potential environmental impacts that may result from the proposed action.

A full EAF is appropriate when an action is classified as a Type 1 action under SEQR. A comprehensive plan is a village-wide plan for the future and establishes a set of policies and projects to advance the vision and goals established in the plan. This EAF is an analysis of the proposed adoption of the comprehensive plan, and does not supplant any site-specific environmental analysis that would typically be required for development projects subject to SEQR review. Being more general than a site-specific process, the EAF can be used to consider and examine broad-based actions and does not address individual projects which may be proposed in the future.

The SEQRA process allows a municipality and the public to analyze effects of the proposed actions and the potential aggregate impacts of the proposed actions. The proposed action by the Village of Ballston Spa is to adopt a comprehensive plan. In general, the adoption of the plan by the village will not have an adverse environmental impact.

The adoption of the plan will not result in the approval of any development activity, either private or public. All proposed new projects would be subject to specific SEQR review, determination of significance, permitting (if necessary) and compliance with the precepts and policies of the comprehensive plan.

The additional information that follows takes into consideration the land uses, management of development, and maintenance of resources for the areas involved in order to make the analysis of the proposed action clearer.

#### **Anticipated Impacts**

The proposed action of adoption of the comprehensive plan is anticipated to provide benefits to the village and the community, the plan is not expected to result in any significant adverse environmental impacts, and will not result in a direct physical change to the area. The comprehensive plan carefully considers the environmental and contextual setting of the village which is reflected in the policies and

recommendations and it is anticipated that the plan will result in an overall beneficial impact to the environment within the Village of Ballston Spa.

Much of Ballston Spa's history is directly tied to its proximity to the Kayaderosseras Creek and the natural springs that are in the village. The creek bisects the village, separating the north and south end by steep slopes. A goal of the plan is to reconnect Ballston Spa, both visually and physically, with the creek and itself. The comprehensive plan recommends growth and conservation in ways that are in balance with one another and are beneficial to the village and the environment.

#### Impact on Land

Adoption of the comprehensive plan is not anticipated to have any adverse impact on land resources in the village. The plan aims to conserve and add to open spaces in the village, when and where appropriate, and to focus any new residential development into areas that are already zoned for that use. Any new commercial uses added to currently residential areas is meant to be context based and limited to uses that will mix well with residences and not cause a nuisance. While there may be an increase in density and intensity of development in these areas, the critical open spaces that currently exist in Ballston Spa will remain.

## Impact on Water

Adoption of the comprehensive plan by the will have no adverse impact of the existing water resources in the study area. The plan proposes a trail along Kayaderosseras Creek, a tributary to the Hudson River. This trail would effectively create a greenway along the creek where no development may occur. Buffers surrounding streams play a key role in improving water quality, and the buffer created by this trail will serve to reduce runoff and pollutants entering the creek and ultimately reaching the Hudson River. Additionally, open spaces play a critical role in maintaining water quality by way of infiltration which reduces stormwater runoff, improves aquifer recharge and reduces the level of pollutants that ultimately reach the waterways.

The comprehensive plan includes recommendations for stormwater management to help protect and enhance the quality of water resources.

#### Impact on Air

The adoption of the comprehensive plan is not foreseen to have any adverse impact to the air quality in the village. In fact, the document encourages the enhancement and permanent protection of open space and the enhancement of non-motorized transportation including planning of additional land for public trails in the village. In addition to improvements to the village sidewalk system, the projects proposed in the comprehensive plan recommend landscaping and planting street trees to improve the aesthetics of the street and act as visual cues to calm traffic. Trees and natural vegetation also play the added role of improving air quality in the area.

#### Impact on Plants and Animals

The adoption of the comprehensive plan should have no adverse impacts on plants and animals in the study area. In fact, the plan promotes the conservation of the Kayaderosseras Creek and other natural areas in the village. Preserving large tracts of open land reduces fragmentation of habitat for plants and animals which will benefit these species in the long-term. While the plan does advise for the creation of a trail network in the village, this would have a very slight impact on habitat as a narrow trail for walking and cycling promotes the use and appreciation of plants and animals.

#### Impact on Agricultural Land Resources

Adoption of the comprehensive plan by the Village of Ballston Spa will not adversely impact agricultural resources, as there are not any located in the study area. The village does host a twice weekly farmers' market in the summer months, which may be enhanced by improvements to the Central Business District of the village that the plan espouses.

#### Impact on Aesthetic Resources

By advocating for the enhancement and protection of the aesthetic resources that give the village its charm and walkability, the comprehensive plan would both help maintain the character of the Village of Ballston Spa and add to it over time through policies of contextual growth. Aesthetic improvement projects and funding initiatives would potentially be subject to subsequent review under SEQR.

#### Impact on Historic and Archaeological Resources

The comprehensive plan will have a beneficial impact on the historic and archaeological resources in the village. One of the stated goals of the comprehensive plan is to preserve and enhance the historic central business district that the village is known for. This includes any archaeological resources. The plan go on to recommend an inventory of historic protections and the development of a village-specific set of historic preservation design guidelines. Identifying the important elements of the village's historic and archaeological resources is the first step to enhancing and protecting them.

## Impact on Open Space and Recreation

Overall, adoption of the comprehensive plan will have a beneficial impact on open space and recreational resources throughout the community. A project advocated by the comprehensive plan is improvements to Kelley, Wiswall, Iron Spring and Victory Circle Parks, which include open space for recreation, viewing areas, a dog park, playgrounds and walking trails around the Kayaderosseras Creek. Another goal is for the creation of a village wide trail network that also connects to the Zim Smith Trail.

## Impact on Critical Environmental Areas

The adoption of the comprehensive plan will have no adverse impact as no Critical Environmental Area (CEA) have been established in the Village of Ballston Spa.

#### Impact on Transportation

The adoption of the comprehensive plan will have a beneficial effect on transportation by advocating for improvement to the pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure including a village-wide trails network and connection to the Zim Smith Trail. Continued improvements for compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is one of the elements that was recognized as important during the development of the plan. Improvement to the streetscape and walkability of the village overall and additional signage about the location of existing parking in the central business district to improve the flow of traffic are also mentioned in the plan.

Opportunities to connect with the region's expanding trail system, including cooperative projects with the Town of Milton and Town of Ballston and Saratoga County will provide long-term transportation benefits. By connecting Ballston Spa residents with important nearby destinations, and vice versa, by connecting nearby communities to downtown Ballston Spa, the economic vitality of the village can be enhanced.

#### Impact on Energy

Adoption of the comprehensive plan will have a beneficial impact on energy resources as a stated goal of the plan is to embrace "smart technology" in government buildings and street lighting, and to assist residents to harness renewable energy and switch from fossil fuels. The plan also states that the village should ensure local laws will not unreasonably restrict residents from producing their own electric power from renewable resources, without sacrificing aesthetics.

#### Impact on Noise, Odor or Light

Adoption of the comprehensive plan will not result in adverse impacts from noise, odors or light. The plan encourages enhancing adherence to the existing village codes, especially on property maintenance, and in adding code enforcement. These conditions will create a decrease in odors and noises in residential areas. Of course, any new development will create noise and some supplemental lighting, but the areas pinpointed by the plan for compatible development are in vacant parcels or areas that will benefit from investment.

#### Impact on Human Health

Adoption of the comprehensive plan will have a beneficial effect on human health by increasing the walkability of the village, and adding public open space and walking trails. Access to these amenities has been shown to have multiple benefits on public health.

## Impact on Community Character

Adoption of the comprehensive plan will have a beneficial effect on the character of the community. One of the stated goals is to enhance communication and participation among community members, especially youth. The plan will also have a positive effect on growth as the plan provides a path for considered and contextual growth, to improve how growth occurs through design standards.

#### **Alternatives**

There are three alternative actions that the village can pursue. These are:

- 1. Adopt the comprehensive plan as proposed
- 2. Adopt an altered plan
- 3. Do not adopt the comprehensive plan.

Of the available alternatives, adoption of the comprehensive plan as proposed would provide the best combination of appropriately scaled growth, recreational and waterfront resource enhancement, and natural resource protection in accordance with the shared goals of the village. The overriding goal of the community, stated in comprehensive plan is to *protect the character of the village while allowing growth*. The comprehensive plan, as proposed, would go the farthest toward achieving this goal.

It is difficult to anticipate possible alternatives to a plan, as opposed to specific projects proposed within. The most obvious alternative would be to take "no action." This, essentially, means that that the village would not adopt the comprehensive plan.

Another alternative action for the village is to adopt an altered comprehensive plan. This document was written with substantial community input, in the form of a Steering Committee and a community survey with over 800 responses, and after careful analysis of the study area's natural and cultural resources. Much thought and care were put in to create a balance of the community goals of protecting architectural and natural resources and allowing for downtown revitalization and growth. Altering any of the main aspects of the comprehensive plan would result in a disruption of this balance.

Adoption of the comprehensive plan, as proposed, would best ensure that the community's shared vision and goals for the village are achieved. As the plan is implemented over time, the strategic actions identified in the plan will help enhance the economic vitality, livability and unique character of the Village of Ballston Spa.

# Village of Ballston Spa Zoning Advisory Committee Charter

August 20, 2023

The Village of Ballston Zoning Advisory Committee (ZAC) shall be formed to assist the Village Board of Trustees in developing and updating village zoning. With support from one or more zoning experts contracted by the Village, the ZAC will provide recommendations for updating zoning using the Comprehensive Plan as guidance, as well as input from village residents, stakeholders, zoning from similar municipalities, and model zoning from relevant professional bodies.

The final product of the ZAC will be a revised zoning code for Village Board consideration for all areas of the village. The primary goals of the zoning recommendations will be the preservation of village character, the enhancement of quality of life, and the promotion of economic growth, as described in the Comprehensive Plan.

The ZAC will consist of 13 members in total, ten members appointed by the Board of Trustees following the Committee Policy approved by the Village Board, the Building Inspector/Code Enforcement Officer, and the Chairs of the Zoning Board of Appeals and the Planning Board. No member of the Board of Trustees may select a member of the Board of Trustees for membership on the ZAC, including themselves.

The members of the ZAC will choose a Chair who will be responsible for convening and presiding over meetings, keeping ZAC records, and presenting its recommendations. The committee will meet at such times as the majority may determine. The ZAC will keep minutes of its meetings and record all such data as is necessary to provide information for such recommendations. ZAC records shall be available to the Village at any time, including for production to the public upon request.

The ZAC will have complete access to otherwise public records of the Village. The members of ZAC may also meet with department heads and other village staff as deemed appropriate by a majority of the ZAC members.

The ZAC will conduct its meetings with notice of meetings, and public attendance is welcomed. The ZAC can meet without a quorum but cannot vote on matters without a quorum. A quorum shall be defined as seven members of the 13-member committee. ZAC members shall have the option to participate in ZAC meetings remotely.

# **Purpose and Duties**

August 28, 2023

The Village of Ballston Zoning Advisory Committee (ZAC) shall be formed in order to assist the Village Board of Trustees in developing and updating village zoning. The ZAC, with support from one or more zoning experts contracted by the Village, will provide recommendations for updating zoning using the Comprehensive Plan as guidance, as well as input from village residents, stakeholders, zoning from similar municipalities, and model zoning from relevant professional bodies. The final product of the ZAC is a revised zoning code for Village Board consideration for all areas of the village, which will have as its primary goals the preservation of village character, the enhancement of quality of life, and the promotion of economic growth, as described in the Comprehensive Plan.

The ZAC will consist of ten members appointed by the Board of Trustees following the Committee Policy approved by the Village Board. The members of the ZAC will choose a Chair, who will be responsible for convening and presiding over meetings, keeping ZAC records and presenting its recommendations. The committee will meet at such times as the majority may determine. The ZAC will keep minutes of its meetings and record all such data as is necessary to provide information for such recommendations, and its records shall be available to the Village at any time, including for the production to the public upon request.

The ZAC will have full and complete access to otherwise public records of the Village. The members of ZAC may also meet with department heads and other village staff as deemed appropriate by a majority of the ZAC members.

The ZAC will conduct its meetings with notice of meetings and attendance by the public is welcomed. The ZAC can meet without a quorum, but cannot vote on matters without a quorum. A quorum shall be defined as seven members of the 10-member committee. ZAC members shall have the option to participate in ZAC meetings remotely. Meetings will be held approximately every two weeks.
